## Summary

This test report supports an application for certification of a transmitter operating pursuant to 47 CFR 15.219. The product is the BIS S-301J. The transmitter operates at 1MHz.

## Test Methodology

Radiated emissions testing is performed according to the procedures specified in ANSI C63.4 (2003). Emissions were maximized by rotating the EUT around three orthogonal axes as well as varying the test antenna's height and polarity. The loop antenna's polarity was varied as well for frequencies below 30MHz.

Frequency range investigated: 9kHz – 1000MHz

Measurement distance: 3m

AC Line conducted emissions testing was performed with a  $50\Omega/50\mu H$  LISN.
