1.1 Getting to know your device and accessories

View from left side, front, right side and bottom




No.	Item	Function Instruction
1	Volume controller	Press to adjust the volume of the phone and the receiver.
2	Camera key	Press to launch Camera.
3	Function left key	Press to perform the function indicated by the text above it.
4	Talk key	Press to enter the phone pad in the standby mode. Answer a call, or dial numbers.
5	Start menu key	Press to draw out Start Menu wherever you are.
6	Function right key	Press to perform the function indicated by the text above it.
7	End key	End a call or back to the Today screen
8	Back/Delete key	Back to the previous screen or delete an entry in text/number editing.
9	Enter key	Press to carry out the selection (Enter to submenu, run program etc.).
10	Navigation keys	Using this multi-functional control, scroll through options, items etc.
11	Microphone	Speak to it to talk during a call, or make a recording.
12	Power/Backlight	Press and hold it to power on/off the device. Press briefly to turn on the backlight.
13	Custom key/Notification	Press to run the customized program (See Chapter 5 Reassigning button functions). As a notification

Connect it to a power supply to recharge the battery.


Connect it to a PC to synchronize data.

Listen to audio media, or answer/reject/end a phone call.

Speak to it to create a voice note.

Installing the SIM Card

Follow these steps to install a 3G USIM (Universal IC Card) or a GSM SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card provided by your local network service provider that contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory:



- 1 Press the cover latch and slide down to remove the back cover.
- 2 Find the gap between the battery and the casing at the bottom. Stick it upward to lift the bottom end.
- 3 Insert the SIM card into the SIM card slot with its gold contacts facing down. Its cut-off corner should match the cut-off corner in the slot. Push down lightly and forward to snap it into place.
- 4 Replace the battery and gently push down to snap it into place.
- 5 Replace the cover: Slide it back on, and then push down lightly at the bottom to snap it securely into place.

Battery information

Charging and Discharging

Your device is powered by a rechargeable battery. The full performance of a new battery is achieved only after two or three complete charge and discharge cycles. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times but it will eventually wear out. When the talk and standby times are noticeably shorter than normal, replace the battery. Use only TECHFAITH approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with TECHFAITH approved chargers designated for

this device. Unplug the charger from the electrical plug and the device when not in use. Do not leave a fully charged battery connected to a charger, since overcharging may shorten its lifetime. If left unused, a fully charged battery will lose its charge over time.

If the battery is completely discharged, it may take a few minutes before the charging indicator appears on the display or before any calls can be made. Use the battery only for its intended purpose. Never use any charger or battery that is damaged. Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object such as a coin, clip, or pen causes direct connection of the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals of the battery. (These look like metal strips on the battery.) This might happen, for example, when you carry a spare battery in your pocket or purse. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the connecting object. Leaving the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a closed car in summer or winter conditions, will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery between 15°C and 25°C (59°F and 77°F). A device with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Battery performance is particularly limited in temperatures well below freezing.

Do not dispose of batteries in a fire as they may explode. Batteries may also explode if damaged. Dispose of batteries according to local regulations. Please recycle when possible. Do not dispose as household waste.

• Standby time:

GSM: 220 - 260 hours WCDMA 190 - 250 hours

• Talk time (Screen off):

GSM: 5 - 8 hours WCDMA 2 - 4 hours

Checking the battery power

- On the Today screen, Tap Start > Settings > Power (on the System tab)
- Tap the battery level icon on the Today screen

Warning

To reduce risk of fire or burns:

• Do not attempt to open, disassemble, or service the battery pack.

- Do not crush, puncture, short external contacts, or dispose of in fire or water.
- Do not expose to temperatures above 45°C (125°F).
- Replace only with the battery pack designated for this product.
- Recycle or dispose of used battery as stipulated by local regulation.

Charging the battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your device, you need to install and charge the battery. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles. You can charge the battery by:


- Connecting your device directly to an external power source.
- Plugging the device sync cable into the USB port on your PC.

Optimizing the power performance

How long your battery power lasts depends on battery type and how you use your device.

Try the following to help preserve battery life:

• Tap > **Settings** > **System** tab > **Power**. On the **Advanced** tab, you can specify when your device turns off to conserve battery power. For optimum conservation, specify 3 minutes or less.



- Use the AC adapter to plug your device into external power whenever possible, especially when using a Mini-SD card or when using a modem or other peripherals.
- Adjust the backlight settings.

Set the backlight to dim after a time delay

If your device supports it, you can set the backlight to dim after a specific amount of time has elapsed.

- 1 Tap > Settings > System tab > Backlight.
- 2 Tap the **Battery power** tab or the **External power** tab.
- 3 Select the Turn off backlight if device is not used for check box, and specify the time delay.

Dealing with low battery

In case that the battery is running out, you are supposed to:

- Charge the battery using the AC adapter, especially when you are using a Mini-SD card, modem, or other peripherals.
- Save all unsaved data if necessary
- Power off your device

Starting up

Turning on/off the device

Press and hold **Power** key to turn it on. First time you do this, you are asked to complete a calibration process. For more information, see Section **Calibrate the device**.

To turn off the device, press and hold **Power** again.

○ Note When your phone is switched on, you can press briefly Power to temporarily turn it off and switch it to sleep mode. However, you can still receive messages and calls in this status.

Device Lock

You can lock your device to prevent the items on the Today screen from responding to any tap, or applications being accidentally launched. Once you have your device locked, press **Power** to light it.

Locking/Unlocking your device

- On Today screen, tap **Device unlocked** section.
- To unlock it, just tap **Unlock** or press **LSK**, in the middle screen, tap **Unlock** button again.

Calibrating the device

To complete a calibration process:

• Following the cross as it moves about, tap the center of it when it holds and is still. The calibration process helps you tap an item more precisely with the stylus.


If your device does not respond to screen taps that accurately, follow the steps to re-calibrate it:

Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Screen

On the General tab, tap Align screen,

The Today screen

The Today screen displays important information, such as upcoming appointments, status indicators, the current date and time, profile, text messages. At shortcut bar, icons of programs you have recently used are lined, in which you can tap one then press **RSK** to open a program directly.



- To access the Today screen from anywhere, tap **Start > Today**.

 To personalize your Today screen, see "**Personalizing your Pocket PC Phone**" in **Chap.5**
- Soft key bar Perform the function indicated on top of it.

Introduction: Input Panel

When you start a program or select a field that requires text or numbers, Input Panel appears.

Input Panel provides various input methods, including Block Recognizer, Keyboard, Letter Recognizer, Phone Pad, and Transcriber.

By default, the Input Panel icon appears on the menu bar to indicate which input method is currently selected. Tap the arrow beside you can select other input methods.

To show/hide Input Panel

• Tap the Input Panel con on the menu bar

On-screen Keyboard

Switch to on-screen keyboard, and then use stylus to tap on the smart keyboard to enter characters.

☐ Tips: Tap áü to enter miscellaneous vowels or symbols.

☐ Tips: Using (Tap to blacken) Shift +?, Ctl +?, Shift + Ctl +? ("?" stands for other keys) to utilize key combinations, you can perform Copy, Cut, etc. just like on a real keyboard.

Keyboard options

Tap the selector arrow and select **Options**

In Input method box, select Keyboard

- Tap the circle before "Large keys" to enlarge the smart keyboard.
- Select the Use gestures for the following keys check box to enable gesture command.

Letter Recognizer

With Letter Recognizer, you can write individual letters, numbers and punctuation, which are then converted into typed text.

Using Letter Recognizer

Tap the Selector arrow, and tap Letter Recognizer.

The handwriting area is divided into three designated parts: ABC, abc, and 123(all dimmed)

Write characters, numbers, symbols, and punctuation in separate area:

- Write in the ABC area to enter capital letters.
- Write in the abc area to enter lowercase letters.
- Write in the 123 area to enter numbers.
- Tap the box in the right corner labeled "@\$*" to open table of symbols and punctuation.
- © Note: Letter Recognizer is available when text entry is possible

☐ Tip: For help with using Letter Recognizer, tap "?" in the right corner to see demo.

Block Recognizer

With **Block Recognizer**, you use a single stroke to write individual letters, numbers and punctuation, which are then converted into typed text.

Using Block Recognizer

Tap the Selector arrow, and tap **Block Recognizer**.

The handwriting area is divided into two designated parts: abc, and 123(both dimmed)

Write characters, numbers, symbols, and punctuation in separate area:

- Write in the abc area to enter lowercase letters.
- Write in the 123 area to enter numbers.
- Tap the box in the right corner labeled "@\$*" to open table of symbols and punctuation.
- © Note: Block Recognizer is available when text entry is possible

☐ Tip: For help with using Block Recognizer, tap "?" in the right corner to see demo.

Transcriber

Transcriber is a handwriting recognition program that allows you to write in cursive, print, or a combination of both. Transcriber works transparently in the background of programs, recognizing words with its integrated dictionary. When transcriber is turned on, it interprets stylus movement anywhere on the screen as handwriting input. For more information about using Transcriber, see **Help** on your device:

- Start a program such as Word Mobile.
- Tap the Input Panel icon at the bottom center of the screen and tap the Input Selector arrow. Tap Transcriber. The Transcriber introductory screen appears.

Start Transcriber

Because Transcriber works transparently in the background of programs that accept user input, you must have one of these programs open to use Transcriber.

- 1. Start a program such as Word Mobile.
- 2. Tap the Input Panel icon at the bottom center of the screen and tap the Input Selector arrow.
- 3. Tap Transcriber.

The Transcriber introductory screen appears.

Use the Transcriber keyboard

Transcriber comes with an on-screen keyboard that provides an easy way to add punctuation or a special symbol to existing text.

From a program, tap ===on the Transcriber toolbar.

The keyboard remains visible until you tap the button again.

Tips

To reposition the keyboard, tap and hold the title bar, then drag to the desired location.

When no text is selected, you can also open the keyboard by doing the Ugesture.

To edit text

- 1. In a program, draw a line across the text you want to edit.
- 2. After you lift the stylus from the screen, the line will disappear and the selected text will be highlighted.
- **3.** Do either of the following:
- Rewrite the text.
- Use gestures to capitalize letters, insert a space, and so on. For information about using gestures, see "Transcriber Gestures" in this chapter.

Using gestures in Transcriber

Use quick strokes of the stylus to edit your text. Do the Enter, Space, and Tab gestures while writing text to insert returns, spaces, or tabs.

Write with Transcriber

Transcriber allows you to write in cursive, print, or a combination of both.

- 1. From a program, position the cursor where you want text to appear.
- 2. Use the stylus to write anywhere on the screen.

The handwriting will be converted to text shortly after you lift the stylus from the screen.

Optimize handwriting recognition for Transcriber

If Transcriber does not recognize your handwriting as accurately or quickly as you'd like, there are some things you can do to optimize handwriting recognition.

- Select the Writing Direction picture that best matches the slant of your handwriting. For information, see <u>Set Transcriber startup options</u>.
- Use Letter Shapes to eliminate letter shapes that you do not use or to learn methods of writing characters that will make them easier for Transcriber to recognize. For information, see Match letter shapes to handwriting.
- Try writing in another format. If you have been printing, try writing cursive, or if you have been writing in both cursive and print, try printing alone.
- Adjust the speed at which Transcriber returns text after you write. For information, see <u>Set Transcriber text entry options</u>.
- Add a user dictionary that contains special terms you may be using, such as medical or legal terms. For information, see <u>Create a dictionary for Transcriber</u>.

Verify that you are using your Letter Shapes user profile. For information, see <u>Save a Letter Shapes user profile</u>.

Note

The next time you write the shorthand text, the appropriate program will open.

Show or hide the Transcriber toolbar

The Transcriber toolbar, which appears at the bottom of the screen when Transcriber is open, provides easy access to several tools, Enter, Space, and Backspace buttons, and Left and Right arrow buttons.

• From a program, tap the **Transcriber** icon at the bottom of the screen.

Drawing and Writing on the Screen

Drawing on the Screen

With your Pocket PC Phone, you can draw directly on the screen, or write on the screen and save notes in your own handwriting. To do this, you must set the input mode in Notes to Writing. If you prefer to use handwriting or frequently add drawings to your notes, you may find it helpful to set Writing as the default input mode. If you prefer typed text, set Typing as the default input mode. For more information on what you can do with Notes, see "Notes" in

Chapter 7.

To set the input mode for Notes

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- 2. In the note list, tap Menu > Options.

- 3. In the Default mode box, tap one of the following:
- Writing if you want to draw or enter handwritten text in a note.
- Typing if you want to create a typed note.
- 4. Tap OK.

To write a note

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- 2. In the note list, tap New.
- 3. Write your text on the screen.
- 4. When finished, tap OK to return to the note list.
 - © **Notes** To select handwritten text, tap and hold next to the writing. As soon as dots appear, and before they form a complete circle, quickly drag across the writing. If a letter crosses three ruled lines, it is treated as a drawing rather than text.

To draw in a note

To draw on the screen, use the stylus like a pen.

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- 2. In the note list, tap New.
- 3. Draw on the screen, crossing at least three ruled lines.
- 4. A selection box labeled Drawing appears around your drawing.
- 5. When finished, tap OK to return to the note list.
 - © **Note** To select a drawing (for example, to copy or delete it), tap and hold the drawing briefly. When you lift the stylus, the drawing is selected.

Searching

You can search for files and other items stored on your device in the My Documents folder or on a storage card.

You can search by file name or by key words located in the item. For example, you can search E-mail messages, notes, appointments, contacts, and tasks as well as in online **Help**.

To search for a file or an item

- 1 Tap Start > Program > Search.
- 2 In Search for, enter the file name, word, or other information you want.
- 3 If you have searched for an item before, tap the arrow in **Search for** to find it in the searching history.
- 4 In Type, select a data type to help narrow your search area.
- 5 Type Search.
- 6 In the **Results** list, tap the item you want.
- © Note: The My Documents folder and its subfolders are included in the search area.
- ⊚ **Note**: Results found on a storage card is indicated by an icon.

Using the phone

You can use your pocket PC phone to make, receive calls, record call history and send SMS/MMS messages. You can also take notes during a call, dial directly from **Contacts**, and copy SIM contacts to phone.

PIN

Most SIM cards are preset with a PIN provided by your wireless service provider.

- 1 Under this circumstance, enter the preset PIN assigned by the wireless service provider.
- 2 Tap Enter

Please see Secure the phone in Chap. 5 for more information.

Adjusting the device volume

Tap the speaker lcon in the status bar, or press the volume buttons on the right side to pop up the volume meter.

Tap the volume meter of the phone or ringer to increase/decrease the volume.

Tap On, Vibrate, or Off to change the sound scheme.

Note: With Vibrate mode activated, you device turns muted and will vibrate next time you receive calls/messages, and an icon to indicate the mode will appear in the title bar.

Making Calls

Making a voice call

You can make a voice call from Phone, Contacts, Speed Dial, Call History, and SIM Manager.

Making a call from the Today screen

- 1 When on the Today screen, tap **LSK** (**Phone**), or press the **Talk** key to enter the phone screen.
- 2 On the phone screen, tap the number buttons to enter the number you desire, and then tap the **Talk button** to call the number.

Making a call from the Contacts application

To make a call by Contact name:

- 1 Tap Contacts from Start Menu.
- 2 Use **Navigation Up/Down** to scroll to a desired name, press **Talk** twice to call; or tap a desired name to enter the details, and then press **Talk** to call.

 Alternatively, press and hold a contact to pop up the shortcut menu, tap **Call**. If it's a phone contact, you can select **Call Work**, **Call Home**, or **Call Mobile**.
 - You can enter the first letters of the desired the name to search it. Matching **Contacts** are listed.
- 3 Press Talk key to call.

Calling your voice mail box (network service)

To call your voice mailbox, tap and hold Num 1 on the phone screen.

Calling a recently dialed number

When on the phone screen, press the **Talk** key and you see the last call.

Tap **Talk** button to call it, or tap **Call History** to view other recently dialed calls.

Scroll to one, tap **Call** or press **Talk** key to call.

☐ Tip: you can also tap the icon (Phone with a green arrow) before the number to call it.

Making a call from Call History

Tap Call History from the phone screen.

Tap Menu > Filter to define a category

Do as what described above.

Making a call from a hyperlink

When you see an underlined phone number denoting a hyperlink in an E-mail, just scroll to it, and press Talk key to call it.

Answer or rejecting a call

When you get an incoming call, it will display on the screen its name or number. If you have not saved this number, you can only see its number.

Press Talk key or tap LSK (Answer) to answer it.

To mute the ringing tone, press + or – on the right side of your device.

If you want to reject it, tap **RSK** (Ignore). The caller will hear a line busy tone.

© Note: A rejected call will be diverted to voice mailbox if you subscribed this service.

Answering another call at Call Waiting

If you are already in a phone conversation when another call comes in, a Call Waiting screen will appear. You have to shelve the formal on hold to answer the latter.

Tap LSK (Answer) or the Talk key to shelve the first call on hold and answer the second.

If you prefer to ending the first call before answering the incoming call, first press Power, and then tap LSK (Answer) or Talk key to answer it.

To reject the latter, just press **Power** or tap **RSK** (**Ignore**).



Making a call from Speed Dial

On the phone screen, tap Menu > Speed Dial

You see a speed dial named Voicemail in there, with the dial number "1" ahead it.

You need to create some speed dial entries here. To create a speed dial entry, see **Chap. Adding a speed dial entry.** Back to speed dial list, you will see the entries you created.

To call a speed dial:

- On the phone screen, tap and hold a number button until the call is launched.
- If it is a 2-digit speed dial, tap the tens digit, then tap and hold the other until the call is launched.

Functions during a call

Many of the functions you can use during a call are network services.

△Note: Network support from network service provider is the precondition of your using these functions.

Holding a call

During a call, tap **Hold** on the screen (or from **Menu**) to prevent the other party from hearing your voice.

This call is not yet hung up and you can tap **Unhold** on the screen (or from **Menu**) to resume.

During a call containing at least two parties, you can tap **Swap** button to switch to another.

Note: only the one you switch to can hear you.

Mute

If you want to turn off the speaker during a call, tap **Mute**. Tap **Unmute** to revert. With the speaker muted, the other party can't hear you but you can hear him unless he mutes his speaker, too.

Increasing/decreasing volume

During a call, press + or - to increase or decrease volume

Conference call

Please refer to Sitting a call conference for details

Additional Dialing information

Making an emergency call

You can make an emergency call under any circumstances, even if you have your SIM card or phone locked.

Enter the emergency number that is available for your locale, and press the **Talk** key.

Additional emergency numbers may be included in your SIM card. Contact your service provider for details

Making an international call

Tap and hold **Num 0** until a + sign appears. The + is for international prefix of the country you attempt to call.

Enter the full phone number, press **Talk** key. The number includes country code, area code (without a "0" at the very beginning,) and main number.

Ring tone settings

From the Phone keypad, tap **Menu > Options > Phone tab.**

In Sounds:

Using different ring types, you change the way you are notified of incoming calls.

Tap the Ring type box to find the type (ring, vibration, or combination of both) you preferred.

Tap the Ring tone box to select a tune you like. You can tap the control buttons to listen to the sample.

☐ Tip: you can also use custom *.wav, *.mid, *.mp3, or *.wma files as ring tones.

Please see **Help** topics on **Change the ring tone** & **Active Sync** for detailed instructions.

In **Keypad**, you can select **Long/Short/Off** tone when you tap and hold the buttons on the phone keypad.

Phone services

Here lists several services that help you handle incoming calls as you wish.

Focus on a service type then tap the **Get Settings** button to retrieve settings from network; you can also change them here.

Networks

You can view available wireless networks, assign another network to connect if the current one turns available. In addition, you can choose to manually/automatically the network. For more information on network settings, please see **Help** topics related.

To change network provider

Tap Start > Settings > Phone > Network tab

By default, your device displays the current network name here; however, you can choose a preferred one:

Tap **Start > Settings > Phone > Network** tab.

By default, the **Network selection** box is set to **Automatic**.

Select Manual and wait for it to search for all available network providers. Choose one to register.

Tap **Set networks** and you see a list of networks it has read from the network.

Select one and press Move up or Move down to arrange the order.

Synchronizing your phone

Using ActiveSync

Maintaining a steady connection between your Phone and your desktop or notebook PC is essential. This process of sharing information is called "synchronization." **Active-Sync** synchronizes information stored on your Phone from your PC or **Microsoft Exchange Server**.* It also allows you to share files between your Phone and your PC.

When you synchronize, **ActiveSync** compares the information on your Phone with the information on your PC and/or **Exchange Server** and updates all locations with the

most recent information.

With **ActiveSync**, you can:

- Keep your Outlook information up-to-date by synchronizing your Phone with your PC.
- Maintain connection with your **Inbox**, **Calendar**, and **Contacts** with a server* so that you have the latest information, even when your computer is turned off.
- Copy (rather than synchronize) files between your Phone and your PC. Installations of new Phone software applications / utilities are done through ActiveSync.
- Have control over when synchronization occurs by taping a synchronization schedule.*
- Tap which types of information are synchronized, and specify how much information is synchronized. For example, you can choose how many weeks of past appointments to synchronize.
- Using Server ActiveSync, you can synchronize information directly with Microsoft Exchange Server 2003.*
- * Wireless access to Outlook or Microsoft Exchange requires IT configuration. Additional software and hardware may be required.

Installing ActiveSync

Before synchronization can begin, you must install Active-Sync 3.7 or above on your desktop or notebook PC. Use the Companion CD that came with your device, or install ActiveSync free by downloading the software from Microsoft's web site at http://www.microsoft.com/windowsmobile.

ActiveSync is already installed on your phone.

Creating a partnership

After the ActiveSync installation is completed, the **New Partnership** wizard will help you set up a partnership between your Phone and your desktop or notebook PC. Your first synchronization process will automatically begin when you finish using the wizard. After the first synchronization, you will notice that the information from your PC that you taped now appears on your Phone. Before setting up ActiveSync, connect the device to your computer using a USB port, or via infrared connection.

Using synchronization

The first synchronization begins automatically after you finish using the New Partnership wizard. By default, ActiveSync does not automatically synchronize all Outlook information. You can use ActiveSync options to turn synchronization for specific information types on and off:

- 1. On your PC, open the Microsoft ActiveSync program. Tap Options.
- 2. By default, Calendar, Contacts, Tasks, and Inbox will be synchronized. De-tap the check box for the item (s) you do not want to synchronize.
- 3. To adjust the settings for a particular type of information, tap the type and then tap Settings. For example, you may tap which folders in Inbox to synchronize.

Synchronizing

ActiveSync Server

Before synchronizing information with a server, make sure all the requested server authentication information such as username, password, and the name of the Microsoft Mobile

Information Server are correct. In the New Partnership wizard, tap Synchronize with Microsoft Mobile Information Server and/or this PC, instead of Synchronize with this PC.

To set up ActiveSync Server:

- 1. From the Today screen, press the **Start**, then tap **ActiveSync** from the list of programs.
- 2. Tap Menu, then Options.
- 3. Tap Server Settings, and then Connection.
- 4. In **User name**, enter your Microsoft Exchange user name.
- 5. In Password, enter your Microsoft Exchange password.
- 6. In Domain, enter the name of the domain of your Exchange server (if required).
- 7. If you want the device to save your password so that you need not enter it when connecting, tap Save password.
- 8. If configuring a Server Name, enter the name of your **Exchange server**.
- 9. Tap **Done**. To begin synchronizing with the server, press the **Sync**.

To change server synchronization settings: First, disconnect your phone from the PC. From your Phone's Today screen, tap **Start > ActiveSync**. In the ActiveSync screen, open the menu and tap **Options > Server Settings**. Tap synchronization settings to edit

Calendar, Contacts, or Inbox; change the amount of information to be synchronized. To synchronize the information, tap the Sync [Information Type] with a server checkbox

on the appropriate synchronization settings page.

Synchronizing Inbox

When you tap Inbox for synchronization in ActiveSync, E-mail messages are synchronized as part of the general synchronization process. During synchronization, the following

events occur:

- Messages are copied from the Outlook Inbox folder on your PC, or from Microsoft Exchange Server, to the Inbox folder on your phone.
- By default, when synchronizing Inbox information with your PC or Microsoft Exchange

 Server, you receive only messages from the last 3 days and the first 500 bytes of each new message.
- The messages on your Phone and on your PC are linked. When you delete a message on your phone, it is deleted from your PC the next time you synchronize, and vice versa.
- Messages in subfolders of other Outlook E-mail folders are synchronized only if the folders have been taped for synchronization in Inbox on your Phone.
 NOTE: SMS and MMS messages are not received in Messaging through synchronization. Instead, they are sent to your Phone by way of your cellular service provider.

Synchronizing Calendar

When you tap Calendar for synchronization in Active-Sync, by default Calendar items from the last two weeks are synchronized. Calendar items created on your Phone are copied to your desktop computer and/or server during synchronization, and vice versa. Similarly, Calendar items that are deleted from your Phone are deleted from your PC and/or server during synchronization, and vice versa.

Synchronizing Contacts

When you tap Contacts for synchronization in ActiveSync, by default all of your contacts are synchronized. Contacts created on your Phone are copied to your PC and/or server during synchronization, and vice versa. Similarly, contacts that are deleted from your Phone are deleted from your desktop computer and/or server during synchronization, and vice versa.

Synchronizing Tasks

Task synchronization is automatically taped in ActiveSync. By default, all of your incomplete tasks are synchronized. Tasks created on your phone are copied to your desktop computer during synchronization, and vice versa. Similarly, tasks that are deleted from your phone are deleted from your desktop computer during synchronization, and vice versa.

© NOTE: Tasks can be synchronized only with your desktop computer; they cannot be synchronized with a server.

Customizing the Today Screen

Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab >Today

• On the **Appearance** tab, select a theme you desire for the Today screen.

Setting a picture as the background

- 1 Select the **Use this picture as the background** check box, tab Browse to view the picture files.
- 2 Tap the file name of the picture you choose.
- 3 Tap OK
- On the Items tab, select the items you want to appear on the Today screen.

Setting appointment display in Calendar Options

- 1 Tap Calendar then tap the Options... button
- Tap **Next appointment** to display only the next appointment on schedule.
- Tap **Upcoming appointments** to display the appointments you have not done yet.
- Tap the **Display all day events** check box to display all events (Both done or not) today.
- 2 Tap OK

Setting tasks display in Calendar Options

- 1 Select a task type in the check box below to display the number of that type
- 2 In the Category combo box, you can choose to display all tasks or only personal ones.

Customizing the Start Menu

If you don't want too many items there on your Start Menu, you can reduce them:

Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Menus

You can select/deselect items/programs in the combo box to let it appear on/disappear from the Start Menu.

□ Note: Only 7 programs are allowed on the Start Menu.

Setting Date/Time/Alarm/Language/Regional options

Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Clock & Alarms

Setting Date/Time in Clock & Alarms

Tap the **Time** tab and you see two clock named "**Home**" and "**Visiting**" there.

- In **Home**, you set the time zone, current time and date in your homeland
- While in **Visiting**, you set the same object of a country you are visiting.

Now the two clocks start ticking separately so that you can check either comparably.

■ **Note**: Synchronization will update the time on your phone with that on a PC.

Setting Alarm in Clock & Alarms

- 1 Tap the **Alarms** tab
- 2 Tap Description; use the Keyboard to define a clock type.
- 3 Tap the uppercase letters below to arrange the days on which you need the alarm.
- 4 Tap the time display at the end to set a time for this alarm.
- 5 Tap the bell icon to select the reminder mode: Sound, Flash light, Vibrate, etc.
 If you have the Play sound check box selected, tap the sound selection box beside to select an alarm ring you like.

Changing Language and regional settings

The display style of numbers, currency, dates, and time varies by regions and countries.

You can specify it:

- 1 Tap **Regional Settings**, on the Region tab, select your region and language.
- 2 To detailedly set them up, tap other tabs (Number, Currency, Time, and Date)

Other Helpful Settings

Reassigning button functions

There already are programs that assigned to the hardware buttons, however, you may not satisfied with some assignments as you want those often-in-use

programs to replace the ones rarely run.

To reassign a button:

Tap **Buttons** on the **Personal** tab and you see the names of buttons and their current assignments.

Tap a button you want to reassign, and then in **Assign a program** selection box, select a program to this button.

✓ **Note**: There is an icon representing the original functions of a button. It helps you identify a button and restore its default at any time.

Increasing/Decreasing text size

- 1 Tap Screen on the system tab, and then tap the Text Size tab.
- 2 Tap and pin the slider to move it from **Smallest** to **Largest**.
- 3 You can see an example in the meanwhile.

Owner information

Owner information makes it possible that in case you lose your phone, the person who gets it can contact you in time; In addition, a personalized phone projects owner's individuality.

- 1 Tap Owner Information on the Personal tab
- 2 Enter your information on the Identification tab.

You can also take important notes on the **Notes** tab, or choose to display them when your device is tuned on.

☐ Tip: If you have selected to show owner information on the Today screen, just tap the section there to edit.

Enabling sound notifications

Tap the **Sounds & Notifications** tab

- On the **Sounds** tab, select the check box to enable sounds for events and programs, or choose a soft/loud sound for screen taps and hardware button presses.
- On the **Notifications** tab, select one from the various events in the selection box, and then choose a sound for it. In the following check box, select the way you want this event to be notified (Some may be dimmed according to the event).

☐ Tip: Disabling sounds and flash light helps conserve battery power.

Adjusting the scroll speed

The scroll speed is about how fast you scroll through items on a list.

Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Buttons > Up/Down control tab.

At **Delay before first repeat**, tap and pin the slider, and move it to adjust time it responds scroll.

At **Repeat rate**, move the slider to adjust the time it takes to scroll one item from another.

About

Tap **Settings** > **System** tab, tap **About**.

Viewing the OS version

On the **Version** tab, you see information on version, copyright, and hardware.

Changing Device ID

Tap the **Device ID** tab.

Here it shows you what Device ID is and what it is used for. Note that your Device ID should start with a letter and contains only letters from A to Z, numbers from 0 to 9, underscore, and hyphen.

Why is Device name important?

The device name is used to identify your device in following situations:

- Synchronizing with PC
- Connecting to a network
- Restoring information from a backup

Removing Programs

You can only remove the addition programs you installed. Programs coming with your device can not be removed.

Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Remove programs

In the **Programs in storage memory** list, select an unwanted one, and then tap **Remove** button below.

Note: The last line shows the total memory available.

Managing Memory

See memory details on your device

To ensure a good performance of your device, it's necessary to maintain a sufficient memory.

To see the memory available

Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Memory

You see on the main tab the details of Storage and Program

Tap the **Storage card** tab to see the memory available on the storage card.

Free up program memory

Please see **Help** topics on "**Free up program memory**" for instructions.

To end a program

You can close programs manually to release more memory

Tap Start > Settings > System tab > Memory > Running Programs tab

In the **Running Programs** list, tap the program you want to close, and tap **Stop**.

Tap **Activate** to restore a program, and **Stop All** to stop all running programs.

Backing Up Files

You can back up files to your PC using ActiveSync, or copy files to a storage card you insert into your device. Your device has an expansion slot compatible with a range of secure digital (SD) and multimedia (MMC) storage cards. Using ActiveSync, you can copy or move information from the PC to the device and vice

versa. Changes you make to the information on one computer will not affect the information on the other computer. If you want to automatically update information on both your device and PC, synchronize the information instead. For more information about copying and synchronizing files, see ActiveSync Help on your PC.

To copy files to a storage card

- 1. Push the storage card into the storage card slot until it clicks into place. The card is secure when it does not protrude from the base.
- 2. Tap **Start** > **Programs** > **File Explorer** and navigate to the appropriate folder.
- **3.** Tap and hold the file you want to copy, and tap **Copy**.
- 4. Tap the folder list (labeled My Documents by default) and tap Storage Card.
- 5. Tap Menu > Edit > Paste.

To copy a file using ActiveSync

Copying a file results in separate versions of a file on your device and PC. Because the files are not synchronized, changes made to one file will not affect the other.

- 1. Connect your device to your PC.
- **2.** In ActiveSync, click **Explore**, which opens the Mobile Device folder for your device.
- 3. In the Mobile Device folder, go to the file that you want to copy on your device or PC.
- **4.** Do one of the following:
- To copy the file to your device, right-click the file, and click **Copy**. Right-click the desired folder under Mobile Device, and click Paste.
- To copy the file to your PC, right-click the file and click **Copy**. Right-click the desired folder on your PC, and click **Paste**.

To automatically save files on a storage card

In the Word Mobile, Excel Mobile, and Notes programs, you may find it helpful to save all new documents, notes, and workbooks directly on a storage card.

- 1. From the program file list, tap **Menu > Options**.
- 2. With a storage card inserted in the device, in the **Save to** box, tap the appropriate storage card to automatically save new items on the storage card.
- **3.** Tap **OK**.

Note In the file or note list, a storage card symbol is displayed next to the names of files saved on a storage card.

Protecting Your Device

There are two kinds of security on your device. You can protect your phone from unauthorized use by assigning a type of password called a PIN (personal identification number). Additionally, you can prevent unauthorized access to any part of the device by using password protection.

Your first PIN will be given to you by your wireless service provider; you can change the PIN later.

You create your own password when you begin using your device.

To protect your phone with a PIN

- **1.** From the Phone keypad, tap **Menu > Options > Phone** tab.
- 2. Tap Require PIN when phone is used.

To change the PIN at any time, tap Change PIN.

☐ Tip Emergency calls can be placed at any time, without requiring a PIN.

To protect your device with a password

You can help keep your data more secure by requiring a password every time the device is turned on.

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Password.
- 2. Select the **Prompt if device unused for** check box, and in the box to the right, select how long your device must be turned off before a password is required. In the **Password type** box, select the type of password you would like to use. Enter the password and, if necessary, confirm the password. If your device is configured to connect to a network, use a strong password to help protect network security.

3. On the **Hint** tab, enter a phrase that will help you remember your password, but doesn't allow others to guess your password. The hint will be displayed after the wrong password is entered four times.

4. Tap **OK**.

The next time the device is turned on, you will be prompted to enter your password.

Notes Each time a wrong password is entered, the time the device takes to respond will get longer and longer until the device appears to be not responding. If you forget your password, you must follow the instructions in your owner's manual to clear memory before you can access your device.

To change your password

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Password. You will be prompted to enter your current password.
- 2. In the **Password** box, enter your new password.
- **3.** On the **Hint** tab, enter a phrase that will help you remember your new password, but doesn't allow others to guess your password. The hint will be displayed after the wrong password is entered four times.
- **4.** Tap **OK**.

To display owner information on the Today screen

Having your contact information displayed on the Today screen on startup allows for easy identification of the device in case it is lost.

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Owner Information.
- 2. On the Options tab, select the Identification information check box.
- 3. On the **Options** tab, select the **Notes** check box if you want additional text displayed, such as: Reward if found.
- **4.** On the **Notes** tab, enter the additional text.
- J Tip To display owner information on the Today screen, tap Start > Settings > Personal tab > Today. On the Items tab, select the Owner Info check box.

Connecting to the Internet

Your device is equipped with powerful networking functions that enable you to connect to the Internet through a General Packet Radio Service (GPRS) or Universal Mobile Telecommunications System (UMTS) network. You can set up connections to the Internet or to a corporate network to browse the Internet, and exchange e-mail or instant messages.

Your device has two groups of connection settings: **My ISP** (Internet Service Provider) and My Work Network. The My ISP settings are used to connect to the Internet, while My Work Network settings can be used to connect to any private, corporate network.

To connect to the Internet via ISP

- 1. Obtain the following information from your ISP:
- ISP server phone number
- User name
- Password
- Access point name (required for GPRS connection)
- 2. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Connections.
- 3. Tap Add a new modem connection.
- **4.** Enter a name for the connection.
- **5.** Select a modem from the list:

- If you want to use the mobile phone network, select Cellular Line.
- If you want to use GPRS, select Cellular Line (GPRS, 3G).
- 6. Tap Next.
- 7. Complete the connection wizard by entering the required information and tap **Finish**.
 - © **Notes** To view additional information for any screen, tap **Help**.

To modify your connection settings, tap Manage existing connections on the **Connections** screen, and complete the connection wizard.

To start browsing the Internet, tap **Start > Programs > Internet Explorer**.

To connect to a private network

Connection Setting

- 1. Obtain the following information from your network administrator:
- Server phone number
- User name
- Password
- Domain (If provided by an ISP or a network administrator)
- 2. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Connections.
- **3.** In **My Work Network**, follow the instructions for each type of connection.
- **4.** Complete the connection wizard and tap **Finish**.

© Note To start browsing the private network, tap Start > Programs > Internet Explorer.

To reset or modify the network card settings on your device

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Network Cards.
- **2.** In the **My network card connects to** list, select the appropriate item:
- If you want to connect to the Internet using your ISP, select **The Internet**.
- If you want to connect to a private network, select **Work**.
- 3. In Tap an adapter to modify settings, tap the appropriate adapter.

The fields on the IP Address tab are populated automatically.

- **4.** Configure the TCP/IP settings, if required. If your ISP or private network does not use dynamically-assigned IP addresses, tap Use specific IP address and enter the requested information. Contact your ISP or network administrator to obtain the IP address, subnet mask, and/or default gateway (if required).
- **5.** Configure the DNS and WINS settings, if required. If your ISP or private network does not use dynamically-assigned IP addresses, enter the requested information on the Name Servers tab. Servers that require an assigned IP address may also require a way to map computer names to IP addresses. DNS and WINS are the resolution options supported on your device.

Using Wireless Manager

Wireless Manager allows you to manage and view the status of GPRS/UMTS, Bluetooth or Wireless LAN connections. You can use the device's Power Save Mode to make optimal use of the battery under the WLAN networking environment, view a variety of data related to the current configuration and signal quality,

and increase network security. To run Wireless LAN on your device, you need access to broadband Internet, and the necessary access point or router that emits WLAN signals. If you do not have access to broadband Internet, consult your ISP before you try to run this utility. However, the availability and range of your device's WLAN signal depends on the number, infrastructure, and other objects through which the signal passes.

© **Note:** You can activate Bluetooth on your device and communicate with other Bluetooth enabled devices. To communicate, make sure you have another device with Bluetooth activated on it, which is within the close range of your device (within 10-meter range).

To activate a second generation network like GPRS on your device and communicate with other devices on the network, you need to have a SIM or USIM card installed on your device.

Check for a Wireless LAN signal

Before you start a Wi-Fi connection, verify that your device has access to a Wireless LAN channel signal. You can check the current wireless connection status from the following three screens of your device.

- Today screen. If your device detects a WLAN network connection, the WLAN connection icon appears at the top of the Today screen and a "W" icon appears at the bottom-right corner of the screen.
- Wireless LAN Main screen. The current connection status and signal quality for each specific wireless channel appears on the Wireless LAN Manager screen with the current configuration.
- Configure Wireless Networks screen. This screen displays the wireless networks currently available and allows you to add new ones if available.

© Note: WLAN (Wi-Fi) is the default wireless channel setting for your device. However, GPRS starts by default if your device does not detect any Wi-Fi signal.

To connect to a Wi-Fi network

- Tap Start > File Explorer, find My Device, and then tap to enter the cetk folder.
- Tap Wlanloader to run it. On the screen, tap the Load box to activate driver. Now, it starts searching networks. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Wireless Manager, you can see an option named Wi-Fi there, with its status (On/Connecting/Available) under it.

Highlight Wi-Fi, tap Menu, and then select Wi-Fi settings to configure wireless networks.

You can see a list of network names with their status behind. In additional, you can choose to add new network from here.

Tap the **Networks to access** box to specify a network type.

Once some networks are detected, it pops up a list from the bottom asking you to select one to connect.

To save battery power while connected to a Wi-Fi network

- On the **Connections** tab in **Settings**, tap to run **Cheetah**. Move the **Power Save Mode** slider to a position that optimizes performance with the least power consumption.
- In Power Save Mode box, choose how you deploy the power save mode.

Bluetooth

Using Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology. Devices with Bluetooth capabilities can exchange information over a distance of about 10 meters without requiring a physical connection. You can even beam information to a device in a different room, as long as it is within range.

The software included with your device allows you to use Bluetooth in the following ways:

- Beam information, such as files, appointments, tasks, and contact cards, between devices that have Bluetooth capabilities.
- Create a dial-up modem connection between your device and a Bluetooth-enabled phone, and then beam information using the Bluetooth phone as a modem.

To turn on or off Bluetooth on your device

- 1. On your device, tap **Start > Settings > Connections** tab **> Bluetooth**.
- 2. Select the Turn on Bluetooth and Make this device discoverable to other devices check boxes.
- **3.** Tap **OK**.
- © Note To add an extra layer of security while beaming information with other devices, or to set up Bluetooth synchronization, tap Start > Settings >

System tab > Bluetooth Setting. Bluetooth modes

Bluetooth on your device operates in three different modes:

- On. Bluetooth is turned on and you can use Bluetooth features.
- Off. Bluetooth is turned off. In this mode, you can neither send nor receive information using Bluetooth. You might want to turn the radio off at times in order to conserve battery power, or in situations where radio use is prohibited, such as onboard an aircraft and in hospitals.

- Note By default, Bluetooth is turned off. If you turn it on, and then turn off your device, Bluetooth also turns off. When you turn on your device again, Bluetooth automatically turns on.
- Discoverable. Bluetooth is turned on, and all other Bluetooth enabled devices within a range of 10 meters can detect your device.

To make your device discoverable

- 1. On your device, tap **Start > Settings > Connections** tab **> Bluetooth**.
- 2. Select the Turn on Bluetooth and Make this device discoverable to other devices check boxes.
- **3.** Tap **OK**.
- Onte Selecting the Make this device discoverable to other devices check box also turns on Bluetooth.

Bluetooth partnerships

A Bluetooth partnership is a relationship that you create between your device and another Bluetooth-enabled device in order to exchange information in a secure manner. Creating a partnership between two devices involves entering the same personal identification number (PIN) on both devices. Creating a partnership between two devices is a one-time process. Once a partnership is created, the devices can recognize the partnership and exchange information without entering a PIN again. Make sure the two devices are within a range of 10 meters from one another, and Bluetooth is turned on and in discoverable mode.

To create a Bluetooth partnership

- 1. On your device, tap **Start > Settings > Connections** tab **> Bluetooth**.
- 2. On the Devices tab, tap **New Partnership**.

Your device searches for other Bluetooth devices and displays them in the box.

- **3.** Tap the desired device name in the box.
- 4. Tap Next.

- **5.** Enter a passkey to establish a secure connection. The passkey must be between 1 and 16 characters.
- 6. Tap Next.
- 7. Enter the same passkey that is entered on the other device. You can, however, edit and enter a new name for the other device.
- 8. Tap Finish.

To accept a Bluetooth partnership

- 1. Ensure that Bluetooth is turned on and in discoverable mode.
- **2.** Tap **OK** when prompted to establish a partnership with the other device.
- 3. Enter a passkey (the same passkey that is entered on the device requesting the partnership) to establish a secure connection. The passkey must be between 1 and 16 characters.
- 4. Tap Next.
- 5. Tap Finish.

You can now exchange information with the other device.

To rename a Bluetooth partnership

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Bluetooth.
- 2. Tap and hold the partnership on the **Devices** tab.
- 3. On the shortcut menu, tap Edit.
- **4.** Enter a new name for the partnership.
- 5. Tap Save.

To delete a Bluetooth partnership

- 1. Tap Start > Settings > Connections tab > Bluetooth.
- 2. Tap and hold the partnership on the **Devices** tab.
- 3. Tap **Delete** from the shortcut menu.

Beam information using Bluetooth

To beam information from your device

- 1. On the device, tap and hold an item to beam. The item can be an appointment in your calendar, a task, a contact card, or a file.
- 2. Tap Beam [type of item].
- **3.** Tap the device name to which you want to send the beam.

The item is beamed to the device you selected.

Shote If the device you want to beam to does not appear in the box, make sure that it is turned on, discoverable, and within close range (10 meters) of your device.

Use a Bluetooth device as a modem

You can use a phone that has Bluetooth capabilities as a modem for your device.

To do so, create a Bluetooth modem connection on your device and then send information to another device by using Bluetooth. The device relays the information over the network and then sends back to your device any information that you had requested over the connection.

Once you create a modem connection to the Bluetooth phone, you can reuse it whenever you want to use the phone as a modem. Make sure that your device and the destination device are turned on, Bluetooth is turned on, and that the devices are within close range.

To configure and use a Bluetooth device as a modem

1. On your device, tap Start > Settings > Connections tab >

Connections.

- 2. Tap Add a new modem connection.
- **3.** Enter a name for the connection.
- 4. In the Select a modem list, tap Bluetooth.
- 5. Tap Next.
- 6. If the device appears in the My Connections list, skip to step 11.
- 7. If the device does not appear in the My Connections list, tap New, and follow the remaining steps.
- **8.** Select the device name from the list and tap **Next**.
- **9.** Enter a passkey and tap **Next**.
- **10.** Enter the same passkey on the device and tap **Finish**.
- 11. In the My Connections list, tap the device and tap Next.
- **12.** Enter the phone number to dial for this connection and tap **Next**.
- **13.** Enter the required logon information for this connection and tap **Finish**. You can start using this service for the program that uses the Bluetooth connection, such as Inbox on your device, to send and receive e-mail, or Internet Explorer to browse the Web.

Internet Explorer Mobile

Internet Explorer Mobile is a full-featured Internet browser, optimized for use on your mobile device.

To start Internet Explorer Mobile

• Tap Start > Internet Explorer.

To choose a Home page

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > Tools > Options > General tab.
- **2.** Do one of the following:
- To use the displayed page as your Home page, tap **Use Current**.
- To use the default Home page, tap Use Default.

Tip To go to your Home page, tap **Menu** > **Home**.

To transfer favorites from your PC

You can transfer the favorites you have stored on your PC to your device by synchronizing the Internet Explorer favorites on your PC with your device.

- 1. In ActiveSync on your PC, on the Tools menu, click **Options**, and select **Favorites**.
- 2. In Internet Explorer on your PC, save or move favorite links to the Mobile Favorites subfolder in the Favorites list.
- **3.** Connect your mobile device to your PC. If synchronization does not start automatically, click **Sync**.

To add a favorite

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, go to the page you want to add.
- 2. Tap and hold the page, and tap Add to Favorites.
- **3.** Confirm or change the name, and select a folder for storing the favorite.

To delete a favorite or folder

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > Favorites > Add/Delete tab.
- 2. Select the item you want to delete, and tap **Delete**.

To change how Web pages fill the screen

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > View.
- **2.** Tap one of the following:
- One Column. Arranges the content into one column that is as wide as the screen. This means that you will rarely have to scroll horizontally.
- **Default**. Maintains a layout similar to what you see on a desktop computer, but it makes items smaller and arranges the content so that you can see most of it without having to scroll horizontally.
- **Desktop**. Keeps the same layout and size as on a desktop computer, which will require both horizontal and vertical scrolling.

To change the size of text on Web pages

• In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap **Menu** > **Zoom**, and tap the size you want.

To show or hide pictures on Web pages

• In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > View > Show Pictures.

A check mark next to **Show Pictures** indicates that pictures will be displayed on Web pages.

To clear the History list

1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > Tools > Options >

Memory tab.

2. Tap Clear History.

To save a picture from a Web page

1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap and hold the picture, and tap

Save Image.

2. Do one of the following:

- To save the picture in My Pictures on your device, tap Yes.
- To save the picture in another location, such as a storage card, tap Save As.

To change cookies and security settings

Internet Explorer Mobile supports the protocols used by Secure Sockets Layer (SSL). A connection that uses SSL helps you to send personal information more safely.

Cookies are small files containing information about your identity and preferences so that a page can tailor information to your needs. The page sends the file, and it is stored on your mobile device.

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap Menu > Tools > Options > Security tab.
- 2. Select the check boxes for the options you want, and click **OK**.
- J Tip To prevent Internet Explorer Mobile from accepting any cookies, clear the Allow cookies check box.

To delete temporary Internet files

Some Web content is stored as you view it to speed up the display of pages you frequently visit or have already seen. You may want to delete these files to free storage space.

- 1. In Internet Explorer Mobile, tap **Menu** > **Tools** > **Options** > **Memory** tab.
- 2. Tap Delete Files.

All pages stored on your device, including offline favorites content, will be deleted.

Using Terminal Services Client

The Terminal Services Client allows you to log on to a PC running Terminal Services or Remote Desktop, and use all the resources available on that PC. For example, instead of running Word Mobile on your device, you can run the PC version of Word and access the .doc files available on that PC.

Connect to a Terminal Server

- 1. On your device, tap Start > Programs > Terminal Services Client.
- 2. Enter the server name.
- 3. You can also select a server name in **Recent servers** if you have recently connected to a server.
- 4. Select the Limit size of server desktop to fit on this screen check box if you want to use programs that have been specifically sized for use with your device.
- 5. Tap Connect.

Navigate within Terminal Services Client

When connected to a remote server, you may notice that your device screen is displaying more than one horizontal and vertical scroll bar. Use these scroll bars to either scroll the contents on the PC, or to scroll the PC display through the Terminal Services Client window.

To make sure you are scrolling the PC display through Terminal Services Client, use the five directional buttons at the bottom of the Terminal Services Client window. To better fit information on your device screen, select the **Limit size of server desktop to fit on this screen** check box. For best results, the programs on your PC should be maximized.

Disconnect without ending a session

- 1. From the Terminal Services Client screen on your device, tap **Start > Shutdown**.
- 2. Tap Disconnect.

Notes Do not use the **Start** menu on your device. If a network administrator has configured Terminal Services Client on your device to reconnect to disconnected sessions, and you previously disconnected from a Terminal Server without ending the session, the Terminal Services Client reconnects to that session.

Disconnect after ending a session

- 1. From the Terminal Services Client screen on your device, tap **Start > Shutdown**.
- 2. Tap Log Off.

Chapter 7 Messaging (SMS, Email and MMS)

You can create, send, and receive E-mail and Messages here. In addition, you can check E-mail by connecting your phone to a mail server. Enter different types (Text Messages, Outlook E-mail, & MMS) to check messages.

SMS service

SMS service is provided by network provider, and is for short text message transfer.

First time to send SMS, please check to ensure that SMS Centre number has been set up. You can consult with your service operator for local SMS center number

Creating and sending SMS

Enter SMS, on screen it will list all SMS already received, now press LSK (New) to create a new SMS

At **To**, you can directly enter recipient's number or tap **Add recipient** from **Menu** to add recipients from **Contacts**. This phone supports group-send, by which you can sent SMS to multi-recipients

After entering recipients, press **Navigation Down** to move the cursor below to edit text. See **Chap.3.5: Input method** for instructions.

• Tap quick text on Menu to list the common text all (see figure below), tap a proper text, and then press LSK (Insert) to insert it. Below the text, word count

and capacity are displayed.

• After you finish the text, press LSK (Send) to send it. Once it is sent successfully, it will be saved in a folder named Sent Items

Viewing SMS

On SMS list screen, focus on one item and press RSK to view the detail. Press LSK (Reply) to reply to the bearer. Press RSK (Menu) to do other operations.

Outlook E-Mail

It supports receiving/sending E-mail on your phone. In addition, you can synchronize Outlook E-mail on PC.

Using Outlook on your phone, you need to configure the network and set up your account. Just check them out in Settings.

- 1 On Outlook screen, press LSK (New) to create an E-mail
- 2 At **To**, you can directly enter recipient's number or tap **Add recipient** on **Menu** to add recipients from **Contacts**. This phone supports group-send, by which you can sent SMS to multi-recipients
- 3 Input E-mail subject at Subject.
- 4 After you enter recipients, press Navigation Down to move the cursor below to edit text. See Chap.3.5: Text input method for instructions.
- 5 Press **LSK** to send it to the recipient, in default mode all sent messages will be saved into Sent folder.

MMS

Creating and sending MMS (Multi-media message service) to your friends is much fun and easy. You can insert video/audio clips, music, pictures, photos, funny text in an MMS and sent it to your friends or relatives to enjoy.

Creating and sending MMS

- On MMS main screen, press LSK (New) to create a new MMS
- At To, you can directly enter recipient's number or tap Add recipient from Menu to add recipients from Contacts. This phone supports group-send, by which you can sent MMS to multi-recipients
- Enter your subject for this MMS
- Press Navigation Down to insert multi-media files: There are three parts below: Insert Picture/Video, Insert Text, and Insert Audio. Focus on anyone, and then press RSK to add files. Tap Cancel from Menu to quit.
- Tap Preview Message from Menu to preview the effect as a whole.
- Press LSK to send this MMS

Receiving MMS

System will notice you if you have a new MMS.

You can view the MMS after it has been completely downloaded on your phone in folder MMS.

Menu in SMS/MMS/Email list

On SMS/MMS/Email screen, press **RSK** to open Menu and you can:

Delete

Delete current message

Reply

Reply to all and Forward current message.

Folders

Switch to other folders (including Draft box, Outbox, Inbox, Sent Items, and deleted mail)

Switch Accounts

Switch amongst SMS, Email and MMS;

Move

Move current message into other folders.

Mark as Read

Mark current item as an unread one:

Download Messages

It is only available in Email. As it's only heading and subject that the phone receives from an Email, you need to tap it to download the whole mail to your phone if it is necessary for you to view the detail.

Options

Change options on messages or Email.

Send/Receive

Send or receive messages and Email.

Folders of Mailing System

Folders of a mailing system contain **Drafts**, **Outbox**, **Inbox**, **Sent Items**, and **Deleted Items**.

For efficient use of storage space, please clear termly the old messages in Sent Items.

If current space is insufficient, it only allows you to play the received MMS. Operations like Sending, saving and downloading all turn to be unavailable in that case.

Draft

All uncompleted or ready-to-be-sent messages are stored here.

Outbox

All fail-to-be-sent messages are stored here.

Inbox

All received messages are stored here.

Sent Items

All successfully sent messages are stored here, if the auto-save function of MMS enabled, after an MMS is successfully sent, it will be saved into **Sent Items** immediately.

Deleted Items

In this folder, all files that removed from other folders are disposed. If deleted from this folder, it will be cleared out permanently.

Options

To utilize mailing features better, you can set the parameters.

On SMS, Email or MMS screen, press **RSK** to tap option from Menu and then you can set up following parameters.

Display

Set up it to choose to display or not the time and date in Email information and the way it was arranged.

Sending

Choose to show or not the content of former Email in a reply Email, or backup a sent Email.

Signatures

Create your signature here that you can choose to insert your signature in SMS.

Account options

Here you can respectively set SMS and MMS.

The items in Settings includes: whether to use Unicode which help correct errors in displaying content of messages sent from this phone or, whether to require service center to deliver send report after its forwarding a message to a recipient.

New account

You can set up an Email account here in order to send/receive Email. This phone supports POP3/IMAP4.

You can set up an account by following steps, any question, please consult MSP

Loading messages on SIM

By this function, you can load SMS on SIM from Inbox.

Using Pocket MSN Messenger

Pocket MSN Messenger provides practically instant access to your up-to-date MSN Hotmail Inbox, MSN Messenger, and related options for you to enjoy your Pocket MSN experience.

- Read, write, and send E-mail via MSN Hotmail. Delete mail from Hotmail folders; Manage your Hotmail folders.
- With MSN Messenger, you can check online/offline friends; send or receive instant messages. Subscribe to status updates for selected contacts so you're notified if they are online.

- Options and settings, which help you, create a custom Pocket MSN experience. For example, you can block strangers or people whom you don't want to see you online
 or send you messages.
- © Before you can use Pocket MSN Messenger, your phone must be connected to Internet.

See Connecting to the internet in Chap. 6 for instructions on setting up your Internet connection.

You need a Microsoft.NET Passport or Hotmail account to use MSN Messenger.

To add or delete contacts

To check your own Messenger status

• Tap and hold your own name at the top of the page. Your current status is indicated in the displayed list by a bullet point.

To change your display name

- 1. Tap Menu > Options > Messenger tab.
- **2.** Enter the name you want to display to others in MSN Messenger.

To get more help about MSN Messenger

• From within MSN Messenger, tap **Start** > **Help**.

Chapter 8 Contacts (Phone book)

Overview of Contacts

Contacts is your address book and information storage for the people and businesses you communicate with. Store phone numbers, e-mail addresses, home addresses, and any other information that relates to a contact, such as a birthday or an anniversary date. You can also add a picture to a contact.

From the contact list, you can quickly communicate with people. Tap a contact in the list for a summary of contact information. From there, you can call or send a message.

Want to find a contact quickly? There are several ways to organize your contacts. View contacts by name or grouped by company. Or, assign one or more categories to contacts, so you can quickly filter them.

If you use Outlook on your PC, you can synchronize contacts between your device and PC.

Find a contact

There are several ways to find a contact when your contact list is long.

- 1. Tap ***> Contacts**.
- 2. If you are not in Name view, tap **Menu** > **View By** > **Name**.
- 3. Do one of the following:

- Begin entering a name or phone number in the provided text box until the contact you want is displayed. To show all contacts again, tap the text box and clear the text, or tap the arrow to the right of the text box.
- Use the alphabetical index displayed at the top of the contact list.
- Filter the list by categories. In the contact list, tap **Menu** > **Filter**. Then, tap a category you've assigned to a contact. To show all contacts again, select **All Contacts**.
- Solution
 Note To search for a contact by entering a name or number, or by using the alphabetical index, you must be in Name view. To switch to Name view, tap Menu > View By > Name.

Tips

You can locate your contacts by the name of the company they work for. In the contact list, tap **Menu** > **View By**, and tap **Company**. Tap the company to see the contacts who work there.

When working in Company view, you can filter by categories you've assigned to contacts. Then, only the companies with contacts that have that category assigned to them will appear in the list.

Send a message to a contact

- 1 Tap P > Contacts.
- 2 Tap the contact you want to send a message to.
- 3 Tap the address you want to send a message to.
- 4 Tap the account you want to send the message from.

Tip

To quickly add a contact's address to a new message, tap the To, Cc, or Bcc line, and tap **Menu > Add Recipient**. Tap the contact you want to send the message to and choose the address if necessary.

Why use categories?

Use categories to group related contacts, tasks, and appointments. For example, you can assign work-related contacts to the Business category and personal contacts to the Personal category. You can then use these categories to filter your contacts, tasks, and appointments and quickly find the information you are looking for.

You can also create your own categories, such as Family, to group your relatives' contact information.

Add a picture to contact information

- 1 Tap **P**> Contacts.
- 2 Tap the contact.
- 3 Tap Menu > Edit.
- 4 Tap Picture.
- 5 Do one of the following:
 - Tap the picture you want to add.
 - Tap Camera and take a picture.

Create a contact

- 1. Tap ***> Contacts**.
- 2. Tap **New** and enter the contact information.
- 3. When finished, tap **OK**.

Note

If your contact list has been filtered by a category when you create a contact, that category is automatically assigned to the new contact.

Tips

If someone who isn't in your list of contacts calls you or sends you a message, you can create a contact from Call History, or from the message by tapping **Menu**

> Save to Contacts.

To save an existing contact to your SIM, open the contact and tap **Menu** > **Save to SIM**.

If someone who isn't in your list of contacts calls you or sends you a message, you can create a contact from Call History, or from the message by tapping Menu

> Save to Contacts.

If someone who isn't in your list of contacts sends you a message, you can create a contact from the message by tapping **Menu > Save to Contacts**.

To include a nickname, title, and more, while creating a contact, tap the **Name** arrow. For an existing contact in the contact list, tap the contact, tap **Menu > Edit**, and tap the **Name** arrow.

If most of the contacts you create have phone numbers that begin with the same area code, in the contact list, tap **Menu > Options** and enter that area code in the **Area code** box.

Change contact information

1 Tap 🥰 > Contacts.

- 2 Tap the contact.
- 3 Tap **Menu** > **Edit** and enter the changes.
- 4 When finished, tap **OK**.

Tips

To include a nickname, title, and more, for an existing contact in the contact list, tap the contact, tap **Menu** > **Edit**, and tap the **Name** arrow.

If most of the contacts you create have phone numbers that begin with the same area code, in the contact list, tap **Menu > Options** and enter that area code in the **Area code** box.

Work with the contact list

There are several ways to use and customize the contact list. Here are a few tips on how to make it work for you.

- 1 Tap 🥙 > Contacts.
- 2 In the contact list, do any of the following:
 - In Name view, you can search for a contact by entering a name or number, or by using the alphabetical index. To switch to Name view, tap

 Menu > View By > Name.
 - To see a summary of information about a contact, tap the contact. From there you can also make a call or send a message.
 - To see a list of available actions for a contact, tap and hold the contact.
 - The last method of communication you used to reach a contact is displayed in the contact list. However, you can change what is displayed. Select a contact and press NAVIGATION left or right until the contact method you want appears with the contact's name. A single letter next to the contact information signifies which method you have chosen. For example, If you choose a contact's e-mail address, the letter e is displayed.

• To see a list of contacts employed by a specific company, tap **Menu > View By > Company**. Then, tap the company name.

Tip

To display a greater number of contacts, tap **Menu > Options**, select the **Show contact names only** check box, and clear the **Show alphabetical index** check box.

Create a contact from an existing one

If you want to create multiple contacts that have similar contact information, you can save time by creating one contact and then copying it.

- 1. Tap **P**> Contacts.
- 2. Tap and hold the contact you want to copy.
- 3. Tap Copy Contact.
- 4. Tap the copy of the contact.
- 5. Tap Menu > Edit.
- 6. Change the contact information as needed and tap **OK**.

Note

The displayed category is automatically assigned to the new contact.

Tips

To include a nickname, title, and more, for an existing contact in the contact list, tap the contact, tap **Menu** > **Edit**, and tap the **Name** arrow.

If most of the contacts you create have phone numbers that begin with the same area code, in the contact list, tap **Menu > Options** and enter that area code in the **Area code** box.

Remove a picture from contact information

- 1 Tap 🥙 > Contacts.
- 2 Tap the contact.
- 3 Tap Menu > Edit.
- 4 Tap Menu > Remove Picture.

Create a SIM contact

Contacts can be created and stored on a subscriber identity module (SIM.) If you move the SIM to another device, your SIM contacts are moved as well.

- 1. Tap **P**> Contacts.
- 2. Tap Menu > New SIM Contact.
- 3. Enter the contact's information and tap **OK**.

Tip

To save an existing contact to your SIM, open the contact and tap **Menu** > **Save to SIM**.

Find a contact online

In addition to having contacts on your device, you can also access contact information from your organization's Global Address List (GAL). This enables you to quickly add a message recipient or meeting attendee from a GAL. Access to the GAL is available if your organization is running Microsoft Exchange Server 2003 SP2 and you have completed your first synchronization with Exchange Server.

- 1. Synchronize with Exchange Server if you have never done so.
- 2. Tap **Contacts > Menu > View By > Name**.
- 3. Do any of the following:
 - In Contacts, tap Menu > Find Online.
 - In a new message, tap the To box. Tap Menu > Add Recipient > Menu > Find Online.
 - In a new meeting request, tap Attendees. Tap Menu > Find Online.
- 4. Enter the contact name and tap Find.

Notes

Your device must be set up with a data connection.

You can search on the following information as long as that information is included in your organization's GAL.

- First name
- Last name
- E-mail name
- Display name
- E-mail address
- Office location

Send contact information

Using a text message, you can quickly send someone information about a contact in your contacts list.

- 1. Tap **P** > Contacts.
- 2. Select the contact.

- Tap Menu > Send Contact > Text Message.
 Select the contact information that you want to send and then tap Done.
 In the new text message, enter the address of the person to whom you are sending the contact information and tap Send.

Games

Bubble Breaker

Overview of Bubble Breaker

Bubble Breaker is easy to learn, yet difficult to master. The objective is to align similar bubbles to form large blocks of bubbles before bursting them. The more bubbles you have in the block before they are burst, the greater number of points you will receive.

Tap Start > Programs > Games, select Bubble Breaker

To burst a bubble, the bubble must be connected to other similar bubbles on the playing board. If you tap a bubble that is connected, those connected bubbles will be highlighted and a new bubble will pop up, displaying that block's potential bubble points. Tap your selection again to burst the bubbles.

Breaker Bonus

If you manage to leave fewer than five bubbles on the board, you will be rewarded with more points at the conclusion of the game.

Undo

Moves in Bubble Breaker can be undone. To take back the last move you made, tap **Game > Undo Move**.

Set Bubble Breaker options

Bubble Breaker allows you to vary your playing experience.

- Tap **Game** > **Options**, and select options from the following:
- Play Sounds. Turns on or off the game sounds.
- Confirm End Game. Displays a confirmation dialog at the end of a game.
- Guest Mode. Enables guests to play without affecting the statistics.
- Game Style. Changes the style for new games as follows:
 - Standard the default play mode in which bubbles will not increase as you burst them.
 - **Continuous** whenever a vertical set of bubbles has been burst and the remaining bubbles have shifted over to the right, a new, randomly selected column of bubbles will pop up on the left, allowing a game to be played for an extended amount of time.
 - Shifter when a set of bubbles has been burst, all remaining bubbles to the top and left will shift down and to the right.
 - MegaShift a combination of the shifter and continuous styles where bubbles will shift down and to the right while empty columns will fill on the left.

View Bubble Breaker statistics

Bubble Breaker records your statistics for each playing style.

• Tap Info > Statistics.

Games - the total number of games played.

Average - the average score across all games played in that style.

High - the high score for the particular style.

☐ Tip To reset all your statistics, tap Reset.

Solitaire

Play Solitaire

- To open Solitaire, tap 🐉 > Programs > Games > Solitaire.
- To deal the cards, tap Menu > New Game.
- To display cards in the upper-left stack, tap the stack.
- To move a card to one of the stacks, drag the card. Build the row stacks in descending order, from King to two, alternating between red and black cards.
- In the row stacks, turn a card face-up by tapping it. You can move a King to an empty row stack.
- To undo a move, tap **Menu** > **Undo**.
- Build the suit stacks at the top in ascending order, from Ace to King.
- You win the game when all cards are in the suit stacks.

Solitaire scoring systems

In Standard scoring (the default), you earn points based on time and moves:

- 10 points for each card moved to a suit stack.
- 5 points for each card moved from the deck to a row stack.
- 5 points for each card turned face-up in a row stack.
- 3 points for each card moved from one row stack to another.
- -2 points for each 10 seconds elapsed during a timed game.
- -15 points for each card moved from a suit stack to a row stack.
- -20 points for each pass through the deck after four passes (Draw Three option).
- -100 points for each pass through the deck after one pass (Draw One option).
- You receive a bonus when you complete a timed game. The shorter the game, the larger the bonus.

In Vegas scoring, your ante is \$52 to begin playing each game.

- The object is to earn more than you wagered.
- You earn \$5 for each card moved to a suit stack.
- There is no time penalty or bonus awarded.
- If you select the Keep cumulative score option, you see a running total of your score from game to game.
- When you play using the Draw One option, you can go through the deck only once.
- When you play using the **Draw Three** option, you can go through the deck only three times.

Change Solitaire options

Tap Menu > Options.

Do any of the following:

- In Draw, select how many cards to draw.
- In Scoring, select Standard, Vegas, or None.
- To change the card style, tap the Card Back tab, and select a card.

Note When using the Vegas scoring system, you can keep a cumulative score.

Pictures & Videos

Previewing pictures

Enter **Pictures and videos**, you can preview all pictures stored both on your phone and memory card.

• Press **LSK** or tap certain pictures to view in full screen.

Press RSK to open Menu and you can:

Send—Send pictures to other recipients via MMS or E-mail.

Beam—Transfer pictures to other devices via infrared.

Save to Contact——Assign a picture as a Mini-stamp of a contact

Delete—Delete focused picture

Edit——Edit pictures

Properties—View picture properties like file name, size etc;

Play Slide Show—View all pictures as a slide show

Set as Today Background—Set a picture as Today background

Options—Set general options and slide show options

Press Navigation Left / Right to view the previous / next slide when viewing pictures in full screen.

Now press **LSK** you can send this picture to others, press **RSK** you can open **Menu**:

Zoom—Zoom in/out a picture;

Play slide show—View all pictures as a slide show

Set as Today Background——Set the picture as Today background

Beam picture—Send pictures into other memories by means of wireless infrared.

Save—Save the picture to contact or save it as another name

Edit——Edit picture

Properties—View picture properties like file name, size etc;

Options—Set general options and slide show options

Chapter 10 Camera (Pending)

Before using the built-in camera on your phone, please read this:

- This camera is produced and assembled with superior, high precision technologies. However, there might be bright or dim dots or lines not easy to dispose. You should also pay attention that, when you Capture pictures in a place with a dim light, the amount of impurities (e.g. white lines, etc.) may increase as well.
- Fingerprints or grease sticking to the lens may result in problems such as difficulties in focusing or obscurations of pictures so, before taking pictures, you should mop the lens clean with lens tissue.
- Qualities of pictures taken with the camera on your phone which probably have been long time placed in areas with higher temperature may be discounted.
- Long-time exposure to sunlight can change colors of built-in color filter of the camera that leads to color change of pictures.
- Try not to shake your phone while capturing pictures. When Capturing pictures, hold it firm to your best to keep it still, any motions of your phone may lead to the obscurations of pictures.
- If you are aiming directly at the lamp-house (The sun e.g.) to Capture, picture qualities will get affected.
- Pictures taken and stored on your phone are prohibited to be used for other purpose, which may cause violation to restrictions, by law on copyright. Note that some as well apply to pictures-Capturing restrictions to mission scene, entertainment, etc. even if all these pictures are purely for personal use.
- Be sure that pictures protected by law are permitted to be transmitted only via the media regulated by copyright law.
- Please be aware of protecting others' privacy while capturing pictures with your phone.

Capturing images

You can either press **camera** key on the right side of your device or tap **Camera** icon on **Programs** to start the camera. In the middle of the screen displays the scene captured by the viewfinder

Now you can press **OK** or tap **LSK** (Capture) to take a picture. The pictures you take will be saved automatically.

Capturing a video

To capture a video, you need to tap **Menu > Mode > Video** to change to video mode.

Total length of a video depends on the memory capacity of your phone.

Where photos and video files are stored

All images and videos taken with this phone are saved on your phone by default; however, to ensure that there always is enough space left for system to run other programs, we suggest you to save them on MINI-SD card.

Firstly, be sure that a MINI-SD card has been inserted into the phone

- Press **RSK** on preview screen, tap **Settings** >**General** on **Menu**
- At Store Position, press Navigation Left / Right to alter it as Memory card
- Press LSK to confirm.

Personalizing your camera

You may be not so satisfied with current effect you get from the picture. OK, various options will help you obtain the best effect on your pictures and videos. On preview screen, press **RSK** to pop up **Menu**.

- Mode: You can set camera mode here.
- Zoom: Tap different multiple of focus to adjust focus of lens;
- **Environment**: here there are several different environments for you to choose to obtain the best effect of viewfinder.
- Effect: Taking pictures in different effect.
- **Setting**: In which you can set attributions and parameters;

• Adjust: Adjust brightness, contrast and saturation of camera.

• Album: Browse all your pictures and videos here;

• Exit: Exit Camera.

Playing a file

On Player main interface, press **LSK** to enter Windows Media whose default interface is its library. You can tap from different types of files in specified folders the file you want to play. Press Back to enter playing screen. You can enter Play list by taping Now Playing.

Buttons

Pause playing

You can press **RSK** to pause the current playing file.

· Back to the head of a file

Press Navigation Left while playing a file.

Jump to next file

Press Navigation Right while playing a file.

Adjusting volume

Press navigation Up/Down or side keys to turn up/down the volume.

Main menu of Media Player

Press **RSK** to open Menu.

Now Playing

Tapping menu now to use the following functions:

Library:

Move down:

Move the taped file down in the play list order.

Remove from Play list:

Delete the taped file from the play list, but the file is still in the media library.

Shuffle/Repeat:

Play the files in the play list randomly/repeatedly.

Clear Now Playing:

Deletes all files from the Now Playing play list, but the files are still in the media library.

Error details:

Display error information about the taped file.

Properties:

Display the detailed information of the current taped file.

Library screen

On this phone, all audio and video files are saved in the media library (see the picture below). You can view and choose the files from the media library and add them to the play list for playing.

In Library, press **RSK** to open up Menu (See figure below), you can use functions to operate on files.

Update Library.

You have to update Library to see the newly added files before you find out and play it.

In Library, tap Update Media Library from Menu for system to auto search (See the figure below). Search result will be placed to relative library folders.

Playing directly in Library

You can directly tap and play files in library.

Add files to play list

Only added to play list on playing can the files in Media Library be played with Windows Media Player.

If you need to add a new file already in existence in Library to play list, you have to find out the file in the library folder, focus on the file, press **RSK** to tap Add to play list from Menu (See the figure below) and then you can add it to Now Playing list.

If you focus on a Media Library, tap Add to play list from Menu (see the figure below) and then you can add all files in that folder to Now Playing list.

Delete file in Media Library

Move focus onto files you would like to delete, tap Delete from Menu, then the file will be deleted from both Media Library and your phone.

Player options

In Windows Media Player, press **RSK** to tap Options from menu to set up player.

Playback Options

Here you can set display mode of time stamp and play mode.

Show time as

Set the time display format of file playing.

Pause playback while using another programs

If you do not use this function, the media player will continue playing when other programs are running (except the call function). If you enable this function, then the media player pauses playing when other programs are running.

Resume playback after a phone call

Whether you enable this function decides if the media player will continue playing the file when a call is ended.

Video Options

Here you can change the view mode of videos.



Play video in full screen

"Never" represents playing video files only in windows mode.

"Only when oversized" represents playing video files in full screen only when the resolution of files is larger than that of the screen.

"Always" represents always playing video files in the full screen mode.

Scale to fit window

When the resolution of the video file is larger than that of the screen, you can play it by zooming out the video window.

Network Options

You can change connect speed according to Internet connection you are using to obtain better effect on videos and audios.

Library

Here you can choose whether to enable player in Media Library.

Skins

Here you can tap various appearances of the player.

Buttons

Here you can redefine button functions at Windows Media Player.

Move focus onto a function button you want to redefine, tap Assign from Menu, follow the prompt, press another button you want to assign function to then it is accomplished. Tap "Reset" on Menu to restore default settings.

Chapter 12 Using other applications

Word Mobile

Word Mobile is a streamlined version of Microsoft Word. Word documents created on your PC can be opened and edited on your device. You can also create and edit documents and templates in Word Mobile and save them as .doc, .rtf, .txt, and .dot files. You can have only one document open at a time. When you open a second document, the first one is saved and closed automatically.

When you close a newly created document, it is automatically named after the first several words in the document and placed in the Word Mobile document list. You can easily rename the document with a more meaningful name and move it to another folder or a storage card.

To create a file

- 1. In Word Mobile, tap New.
- 2. You will see either a blank document or template, depending on what you have selected as the default template.
- 3. Enter text as desired.
- **4.** When finished, tap **OK** to save the file.

Unsupported features in Word Mobile

Word Mobile does not fully support some features of Microsoft Word, such as revision marks and password protection. Some data and formatting may be lost when you save the document on your device.

The following features are not supported in Word Mobile.

- Backgrounds
- Shapes and text boxes
- Artistic page borders
- Smart tags
- Metafiles
- **Bi-directional text**. While Word Mobile will open documents containing bi-directional text, the indentations and alignment may be displayed and saved incorrectly.
- Password-protected files. Word Mobile does not support opening password-protected documents. You must first remove the password protection in Word on the PC if you want to view the document on the device.

- **Document protection**. Word Mobile does not support displaying files that have been protected in Word on the PC. The following features are partially supported in Word Mobile.
- Picture bullets
- Revision marks
- Table styles
- Underline styles. Underline styles not supported by Word Mobile are mapped to one of the four supported styles: regular, dotted, wavy, or thick/bold/wide.
- Legacy Pocket Word files. You can open *.psw files in Word Mobile; however, if you edit a file, you will need to save it in *.doc, *.rtf, *.txt, or *.dot format.

 The following features are not supported on the device; however, they are retained in the file so that when a file is opened on the PC again, they appear as expected.
- Footnotes, endnotes, headers, footers
- Page breaks
- Lists
- Fonts and font sizes. Fonts not supported by the device are mapped to the closest font available, although the original font will be listed on the device.

To get more help about Word Mobile

• From within Word Mobile, tap Start > Help.

Excel Mobile

Excel Mobile makes it easy for you to open and edit Excel workbooks and templates created on your PC. You can also create new workbooks and templates on your device.

☐ Tips Work in full-screen mode to see as much of your workbook as possible.

Tap **View > Zoom** and select a percentage so that you can easily read the worksheet.

Unsupported features in Excel Mobile

Excel Mobile does not fully support some features such as formulas and cell comments. Some data and formatting may be lost when you save the workbook on your device. Note the following Excel Mobile formatting considerations:

- Alignment. Horizontal, vertical, and wrap-text attributes remain the same, but vertical text appears horizontal.
- Borders. Appear as a single line.
- Cell patterns. Patterns applied to cells are removed.
- Fonts and font sizes. Fonts not supported by your device are mapped to the closest font available. The original font is listed on your device. When the workbook is opened in Excel on your PC again, the data is displayed in the original font.
- Number formats. Numbers formatted using the Microsoft Excel 97 conditional formatting feature are displayed in Number format.
- Formulas and functions. If an Excel file contains a function that is not supported by Excel Mobile, the function is removed, and only the returned value of the function appears. The following formulas are also converted to values: formulas entered as an array or containing an array argument, for example, =SUM({1;2;3;4}); formulas containing external link references or an intersection range reference; and formulas containing references past row 16384 are replaced with #REF!
- Protection settings. Most worksheet and workbook protection features are disabled but not removed. However, support for password protection has been removed. Workbooks that are password-protected or workbooks in which one or more worksheets are password-protected cannot be opened. You must remove the password protection in Excel on the PC and then synchronize to open the file on the device.
- **Zoom settings**. Are not retained. Excel supports a per worksheet zoom setting, while the Excel Mobile zoom setting is applied to the entire workbook.
- Worksheet names. Names that reference worksheets within the same workbook are displayed accurately, but names that refer to other workbooks, arrays, for example, ={1;2;3;4}, array formulas, or intersection ranges are removed from the name list. If a name is removed from the list, it is left in formulas and functions, causing those formulas to be resolved as "#NAME?" All hidden names are not hidden.
- AutoFilter settings. Are removed. However, you can use the AutoFilter command in Excel Mobile to perform similar functions. If you have an AutoFilter applied to a worksheet that causes rows to be hidden, the rows remain hidden when the file is opened in Excel Mobile. Use the Unhide command to display the hidden rows.
- Chart formatting. All charts will be saved the way they are shown in Excel Mobile. Unsupported chart types are changed to one of these supported types: Column, Bar, Line, Pie, Scatter, and Area. Background colors, gridlines, data labels, trend lines, shadows, 3D effects, secondary axes, and logarithmic

scales are turned off.

Worksheet features.

The following features are not supported in Excel Mobile and are removed or modified when a workbook is opened on the device: hidden sheets are not hidden; VBA modules, macro sheets, and dialog sheets are removed and replaced with a place holder sheet; text boxes, drawing objects, pictures, lists, conditional formats, and controls are removed; pivot table data is converted to values.

• From within Excel Mobile, tap **Start** > **Help**.

Viewing Slide Shows with PowerPoint Mobile

With PowerPoint Mobile, you can open and view slide show presentations created on your PC in *.ppt and *.pps format with PowerPoint '97 and later. Many presentation elements built into the slide shows such as slide transitions and animations will play back on the device. If the presentation is set up as a timed slide show, one slide will advance to the next automatically. Links to URLs are also supported. PowerPoint features not supported on the device include:

- Notes. Notes written for slides will not be visible.
- Rearranging or editing slides. PowerPoint Mobile is a viewer only.
- File formats. Files created in *.ppt format earlier than PowerPoint '97 and HTML files in *.htm and *.mht formats are not supported.

To start a slide show presentation

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > PowerPoint Mobile.
- 2. In the presentation list, tap the slide show you want to view.
- 3. Tap the current slide to advance to the next slide.

If the presentation is set up as a timed slide show, slides will advance automatically.

To stop a slide show

• In a PowerPoint Mobile presentation, tap > **End Show**.

To navigate between slides

You can advance to the next slide if a presentation is not set up as a timed slide show, return to the previous slide, or go to any slide out of sequence.

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > PowerPoint Mobile.
- 2. Open the presentation you want to view.
- 3. Tap > Next or Previous, or tap Go to Slide and tap the slide you want to view.
- (a) Notes If you have zoomed in to see a slide in more detail, you cannot navigate to another slide until you zoom out.

Tapping **Next** or **Previous** may play an animation on a slide rather than navigate to another slide.

Calculator

You can use Calculator to perform basic arithmetic operations such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

Notes

Notes helps you to quickly capture thoughts, questions, reminders, to-do lists, and meeting notes. You can create handwritten and typed notes, record voice notes, convert handwritten notes to text for easy readability, and send notes to others.

Entering information in Notes

There are several ways to enter information in a note. You can enter typed text by using the on-screen keyboard or handwriting recognition software. You can also use the stylus to write or draw directly on the screen. On devices that support recording, you can create a standalone recording or embed a recording in a note.

To set the default input mode for Notes

If you frequently add drawings to your notes, you may find it helpful to set **Writing** as the default input mode. If you prefer typed text, select **Typing**.

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- 2. In the note list, tap Menu > Options.
- **3.** In the **Default mode** box, tap one of the following:
- Writing if you want to draw or enter handwritten text in a note.

- **Typing** if you want to create a typed note.
- **4.** Tap **OK**.

To create a note

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- 2. In the note list, tap New.
- 3. Tap the Input Selector arrow next to the Input Method icon on the menu bar, tap the input method you want, and enter your text.
- **4.** If the **Input Selector** arrow is not displayed, tap the Input Method icon.
- **5.** When finished, tap **OK** to return to the note list.

To record a note

You can create a stand-alone recording (voice note) or you can add a recording to a note.

- 1. Tap Start > Programs > Notes.
- **2.** Do one of the following:
- To create a stand-alone recording, record from the note list.
- To add a recording to a note, create or open a note.
- 3. If you do not see the **Recording** toolbar, tap **Menu > View Recording Toolbar**.
- **4.** Tap to begin recording.
- **5.** Hold your device's microphone near your mouth or other source of sound.
- **6.** Tap when finished recording.
- 7. When finished, tap **OK** to return to the note list.

If you are recording in an open note, an icon will appear in the note.

If you are creating a stand-alone recording, an icon will appear in the note list.

© **Note** To play a recording, tap the **Recording** icon in the open note, or tap the recording in the note list.

Tasks

Use Tasks to keep track of things you need to do. A task can occur once or repeatedly (recurring). You can set reminders for your tasks and you can organize them using categories. Your tasks are displayed in a task list. Overdue tasks are displayed in red.

To create a task

- 1. Tap **Start > Programs >** Tasks.
- **2.** Tap **New**, enter a subject for the task, and fill in information such as start and due dates, priority, and so on.
- 3. When finished, tap OK.
- ☐ Tip You can easily create a short, to-do-type task. Simply tap the Tap here to add a new task box, enter a subject, and press ENTER. If the task entry box is not available, tap Menu > Options and select the Show Tasks entry bar check box.

To change the priority of a task

Calendar

Use Calendar to schedule appointments, including meetings and other events. Your appointments for the day can be displayed on the Today screen. You can look at your appointments in several different views (Day, Week, Month, Year, and Agenda). To see detailed appointment information in any view, tap the appointment.

To send a meeting request

- 4. Tap the name of the contact you want to invite.
- 5. To invite each additional attendee, tap Add and tap the name.

- 7. The meeting request will be sent to the attendees the next time you synchronize your device with your PC.
 - © **Note** When attendees accept your meeting request, the meeting is automatically added to their schedules. When their response is sent back to you, your calendar is updated as well.

Java

MIDlets are Java applications that can run on mobile devices. Your device supports Java 2 Micro Edition, J2ME. The Java software allows you to download Java

applications, such as games and tools that are specifically designed for mobile devices. The Java gives you the flexibility of installing and managing additional J2ME applications from the Internet.

To install MIDIets from the Internet

- 1. Locate the MIDlet/MIDlet suite while connected to the Internet.
- 2. Select the MIDlet/MIDlet suite to download.
- 3. Confirm to start downloading.
- 4. Run the file(s) to install.



Note You can cancel the installation at any time.

To install MIDlets from a PC
